Communication Tips when Caring for your Loved One

In general, it is a good idea to keep communication simple, direct, and positive when talking to your care recipient, especially if he or she has dementia, which could impact memory and cognitive skills.

Here are some tips for communicating with an individual who has dementia:

- Establish eye contact, and use the person’s name when you speak to them.
- Touch your loved one or hold their hand to encourage conversation.
- Ask simple yes-or-no questions, such as “Are you feeling tired?” instead of open-ended questions, such as “How are you feeling?”
- Limit choices to cut down on confusion. For example, don’t say, “What would you like to wear today?” Instead, try saying, “Would you like your red sweater or your gray one?”

Sometimes, those living with the symptoms of dementia are so overwhelmed with the disease; they struggle severely and become distressed and even combative. Sometimes the caregiver is so overwhelmed they struggle to find an adequate response. One good way to respond is by simply saying, “I know this is hard. This is hard for me too.” Then just take a few moments together in silence.

When the loved one struggles to communicate, you can try saying, “Tell me about it.” They may be looking for their baby; they may be thinking they are late for work. You will not be able to convince them that they’ve been retired for 20 years or that their baby is now 65 years old. Trying to do so will only increase their distress. Instead, say, “Tell me about your baby.” Or “Tell me about your work.” Often this promotes a therapeutic conversation and the opportunity to reminisce.
